Partners Are Important

Alberta SPCA Peace Officers investigate thousands of complaints of animals in distress each year, with many of the neglect and abuse cases being complex. This is why Alberta SPCA Peace Officers often partner with police, bylaw and other peace officers in their specific municipalities to help animals in distress. This type of cooperation was on full display late last year as our Animal Protection Team and local municipal enforcement worked to successfully remove and gain legal custody of numerous dogs from an organization.

Alberta SPCA Peace Officers and municipal officers had ongoing but separate interactions with this organization prior to December 2023, however it took working together to finally move forward.

Lenny's New Life

Our Executive Director explains how the work of our Peace Officers and our partner animal welfare organizations has led to a much improved life for Lenny.

“AdMen” in the early 1900s knew it was the picture that sold papers. That’s when the adage ‘a picture is worth a thousand words’ gained popularity.

The picture of this pup and his best friend says more about the benefits of solid partnerships within the animal welfare system than I could ever express in this story.

This is Lenny. He was one of the several near-feral, mucky and unwell labradoodles we seized this past fall from a property owned by an individual breeding dogs.

Thanks to our team who ensured the dogs were removed from this property and seen by a veterinarian, and the partner organizations who helped us shelter, care for and rehome the animals. Due to everyone’s efforts, we are able to make a difference for dogs like Lenny and the other creatures who need us.

In this case, we need to send a huge shout-out to the Hinton and District SPCA. (Did you know not all SPCAs are affiliated? We work together, but the Alberta SPCA doesn’t oversee other organizations with this acronym.)

In December, the teams, along with a veterinarian, went inside the facility to check on dogs and determine which animals were in distress. Alberta SPCA Peace Officers seized a number of dogs at that time and placed them with one of our caretakers.

One week later, local municipal enforcement performed the seizure of additional dogs under the authority of the *Animal Protection Act*, while our organization arranged for a safe place for the dogs to go, as well as for transportation.



We are very proud of our partnerships as we work with Alberta's animal welfare organizations to ensure the best outcomes for animals. This case is a prime example of the work that happens throughout the year with police, bylaw and peace officers across Alberta. In some cases, police officers may assist our team as they attend a property where there's concern for officer safety. At other times, local bylaw and peace officers who are geographically much closer to the animals may check on their welfare on our behalf to ensure a timely response, and in some cases, we are asked to share our experience and expertise on the *Animal Protection Act* with local enforcement agencies.

Once animals are in our care, the partnerships take on a different shape. We rely on sheltering agencies to find homes for many of the animals seized by or surrendered to our Peace Officers. We ensure the animals receive important veterinary care, then we transfer the animals to a sheltering partner who may continue to work on rehabilitating the animal before ultimately putting the pet up for adoption and placing them with a loving family.

The animal welfare system in Alberta involves many groups who strive to improve the lives of animals. Some of these organizations work within a geographical area while others have a niche focus for the work they do. Regardless, the efforts of one organization often touch the work of another, but ultimately we have the same goal. When we work together, not only does it help the animals, it ensures we are working more efficiently. And in the case of this file, numerous dogs will now have the opportunity to find loving families thanks to the combined efforts of numerous animal welfare groups.

Dogos Remained in Our Care for Months



The Dogo Argentino breed are affectionate, smart and loyal dogs, yet a handful of them have been in our care more than three months. It's evidence of a system that is overburdened with animals that need a home, and demonstrates the difficulty of placing cats and dogs that may not be easy to adopt out.

The ten Dogos came into our care in October of 2023 after their owner was unable to care for them due to emergency hospitalization. We immediately took all ten dogs to a veterinarian in order to treat any immediate issues.

Fortunately, two of the older dogs from this group were transferred to the Edmonton Humane Society, one of our sheltering partners, and quickly adopted.

Tux and his Family Required Immediate Help

Alberta SPCA Peace Officers enforce the *Animal Protection Act* in our province and the majority of animals that come into our care are a result of our neglect and abuse investigations. However, there are many unfortunate circumstances that require involvement of our Animal Protection Team. Tux's story is one of them.

Tux, a cute and curious kitten, along with his two sweet siblings and their parents had a comfortable life with all their needs met, that is until their owner died unexpectedly. Left alone there was no one to provide food, water and other essentials. Without delay, our Peace Officer drove to the remote community to collect the cats.

The kittens were affectionate, adorable, and hungry. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, we were able to bring them safely into our care and meet their immediate needs. The cats all received spay/neuter surgeries and vaccinations to prepare them for adoption.

Our next challenge was to find a partner organization to find the cats new homes, ones where they would be loved and cared for. While our Peace Officers do critical work to relieve distress, we rely on vital partner organizations to rehome the animals that come into our care all over Alberta.

Unfortunately, the shelter system in Alberta is under tremendous stress due to a number of factors, including the effects of the pandemic and the financial strain so many Albertans are facing. This means animals can remain in our care for weeks or months until space opens at a shelter. Fortunately, after a six-week stay with us, one of our partner agencies was finally able to take in Tux and his family members and put them up for adoption. We're confident Tux and his family will live happy and healthy lives from here on out.

Prohibition and Fine for Cattle Owner

On October 2, 2023, James Jenkins of Strathcona County pleaded guilty to causing distress to cattle. Peace Officers attended Mr. Jenkins property December 22, 2021 after receiving public complaints that animals were in distress. Investigators found numerous dead cattle on the property, as well as more than 180 cattle that were deemed to be in distress. The cattle were taken into protective custody. Mr. Jenkins was charged by Alberta SPCA Peace Officers with three offences under the *Animal Protection Act* for permitting animals to be in distress 2(1), failing to provide adequate food and water 2.1(a), and failing to provide adequate care when an animal is wounded or ill 2.1(b).

Mr. Jenkins pleaded guilty to all three counts in Alberta Court of Justice in Sherwood Park. He was ordered not to own, possess, control, board or live at a residence with any animals, with the exception of 20 cattle, for a period of three years. Mr. Jenkins was also fined \$3,500. Under terms of the prohibition order, Mr. Jenkins must allow Alberta SPCA Peace Officers access to his properties for the purpose of inspecting animals without warrant, provided 24-hours notice is given.

Humane Education Programs Across Alberta

There are a number of humane societies and SPCAs across Alberta that provide engaging humane education programs for teachers and students. These opportunities, such as field trips and classroom presentations, give students the chance to see the impact these organizations have in their communities, all while learning from local experts.

Read the brief descriptions below to learn more about some of the programs offered by animal welfare organizations across Alberta. For a more detailed description of what each organization offers, visit their website.

Calgary Humane Society

The Calgary Humane Society (CHS) offers customizable, half-day field trips where students learn about the organization and have a chance to connect with animals. CHS also offers classroom presentations from kindergarten to grade 12 on a variety of topics. One such topic, 'Bullying Pets & Peers' has students learn the similarities between bullying and animal cruelty by comparing the motivations and causes behind aggressive behaviours. Additionally, grade 1-9 students have the opportunity to get involved in animal welfare outside of school with the CHS Youth Clubs.

Central Alberta Humane Society

The Central Alberta Humane Society (CAHS) in Red Deer offers both field trips to their shelter and school presentations. Students will learn about the Central Alberta Humane Society, what they do, and why this organization is important to the community. Students also have the opportunity to spend time with some of the adoptable animals during their visit to the shelter. CAHS also offers camps for students between the ages of 6-10 during professional development days and summer holiday.

Edmonton Humane Society

Field trips and school presentations are offered through the Edmonton Humane Society (EHS). Their humane education team has been actively updating existing programs and creating new ones, scheduled for release throughout 2024. One of the new programs, for grades 9-12, will have students exploring the connection between animal abuse and human violence, known as The Link. For students between the ages of 10-14, EHS offers a recently refreshed Pet Sitters course where students learn how to compassionately care for pets while their owners are away.

Medicine Hat SPCA

The Medicine Hat SPCA has once again started school presentations on topics such as animal care and responsibility, and are planning on updating and revamping their education programs in the future.

Every February and March, Alberta SPCA educators and volunteers attend teachers' conventions across the province. These two-day professional development events provide a platform to connect with teachers and share information and resources that inspire kindness, respect, responsibility and empathy towards animals, people and the environment - every living thing!

This year we will be attending seven out of the nine conventions hosted by the Alberta Teachers' Association, extending our reach to Medicine Hat for the first time. Travelling across the province, we will be connecting with teachers from rural and urban schools in northern, southern and central Alberta. Teachers who stop by our booth can explore our resources, ask questions and collect a Humane Educator's Toolkit as well as a classroom poster (available in both English and French).

Deaf Dog and his Pet Siblings Find Loving Homes Thanks to Alberta SPCA Partners

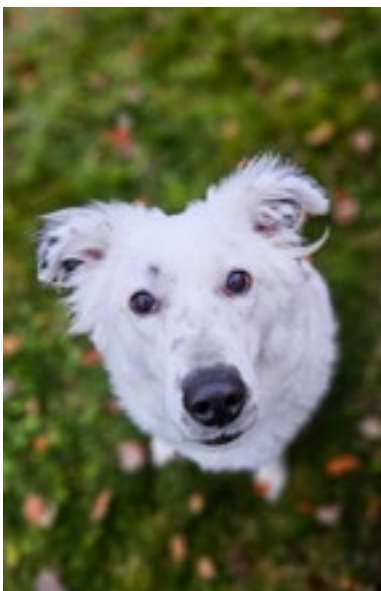
Our Pet Safekeeping Program cares for pets of people who are experiencing difficult times in their lives. This can include those fleeing family violence, or pet owners who face a sudden crisis in their lives such as emergency hospitalization, or loss of a home through fire or a natural disaster. At times like this, pet owners often won't focus on their own well-being until their animals are taken care of, and their predicament usually comes on short notice.

When this happens, our One Family Welfare team must make quick decisions to accept the pets into our program, and they must find a caretaker for the animals on very short notice. This is why our team relies heavily on our partners within the animal welfare system. A mixed-breed dog named Wilder who is deaf, along with another dog and a cat from his home, recently benefited from these relationships.

In Wilder's case, his owner was admitted to an Edmonton hospital, leaving the three animals behind in the home. A social worker at the hospital called our team to apply to get the animals admitted into the Pet Safekeeping Program. In the meantime, the trio of critters was picked up by officers from the Edmonton Animal Care and Control Centre (ACCC) to ensure they were not left alone for very long. ACCC cared for the animals for several days on our behalf until our team could arrange caretaking.

Wilder and the other two pets stayed in our program for 21 days where we ensured their needs were met, including necessary veterinary care. Unfortunately, the owner could no longer care for the animals and they were eventually surrendered to us.

Our focus then turned to finding the animals new homes, and our One Family Welfare team reached out to our partners once again to see which shelter might have space for them. Shelters are often at capacity so we are always grateful when an animal welfare group can help us. This time GEARS Rescue was able to take in the pets and find them all safe and loving homes. In Wilder's case, his new family had experience with a deaf dog making the new relationship a perfect fit.

Pets are often left in precarious situations for reasons that are no fault of the owner, and we do our best to ensure these animals can remain with their people once the crisis situation is alleviated. However, when that's not possible, Alberta's animal welfare system is there to ensure the pets are given every opportunity to live their best lives. We could not do what we do without the help of many groups across the province.

In the meantime, we've invested more than \$10,000 to care for the dogs. The team in Hinton worked with Lenny and some of his littermates until they were ready to be fostered - eventually finding them warm homes and loving families. AARCS and the Edmonton Humane Society also helped rehome dogs from this large seizure.

The funds we raise help ensure we are providing essential care for animals before transferring them to our partner organizations so they can do this essential work. Thank you!

As I've said before, the system is under pressure like never before. Rising costs of living, the cost of pet food, as well as the availability and cost of livestock feed, veterinary access, and other factors are weighing on us, and our donors.

Now more than ever, we need to come together as animal welfare advocates and partners to be proactive in our planning and find solutions together.

Of note, Ontario is looking at legislation that would strengthen their ability to shut down unethical breeders. The *Preventing Unethical Puppy Sales Act* (PUPS Act) if passed, will amend the *Provincial Animal Welfare Services Act* (PAWS Act) to stop harmful dog breeding practices, impose penalties, and make sure that dogs across Ontario receive the care they deserve.

This is something we'll certainly be keeping our eyes on.

Once again, if you're reading this it means you're part of our community. Thank you for all you do.
